Michael Fullan—The Six Secrets by Brad Kolhepp (cohort 6)

I recently had the opportunity to hear Michael Fullan speak on his book *The Six Secrets of Change*. As I listened to Mr. Fullan sharing his “secrets”, I continued to think back to Day One, two years ago when I began my first day as a principal.

What truly resonated with me from Fullan’s talk was the first “secret” that was discussed: “Love Your Employees.” It is by no fault, that this is Fullan’s first secret. Before any positive change is to be made that affects student learning, the new principal must first gain the trust of the faculty.

In order to gain the trust of my faculty from the beginning, I focused on being one thing during my first few weeks: Visible. From the minute I arrived in school I would visit the before care program to meet and talk to the kids and the teachers. Once that was over I would come up to the front entrance and greet the teachers and students as they arrived for the day. During the school day I would make my way to each classroom to talk to the students and get an overall feel for the culture of the school. I made it a point to get to know not only the kids names, but their interests. By being visible, the faculty saw that I genuinely cared about all students and was dedicated to providing them with an effective, high-quality education.

The teachers saw that I was there to support them. Leaving positive notes on their plans about their lessons and classroom environment was

one way to show my support. I also made it a point to recognize different faculty members for specific ways they contributed to the betterment of the school. During Back to School Night I made it a point to say what wonderful things I have seen occurring in each of the classrooms. Performing these actions during the first few weeks proved invaluable in laying the groundwork for the trust needed to promote school change.

By getting to know the relationships between the school’s rituals, artifacts, ceremonies, symbolism and school culture I was able to gain a sense of the school’s “heart” (Deal & Peterson, 1999). With this knowledge, I would then be able to go about building the trust needed from the faculty in order to start the “change” in the school that is needed for an increase in student achievement.


continually innovative with new ideas.”
